Fall Roadside Chipping

Blackberry roadside chipping will begin the week of November 11, weather permitting. This is a great opportunity to clean up your property and to share the cost equally through your Association membership. Please read the following quidelines carefully.

- This chipping is for fallen, dead limbs and branches only. Trimmed branches and trees, leaves and live growth will not be picked up.
- Limbs and branches must be less than eight inches in diameter and ten feet in length.
- Stack debris so that all the limbs are facing in one direction in the right-of-way along the roadsides where it is easily accessible but does not encroach onto the roadway. Workers will not come onto your property or driveway to pick up your brush.
- The mulch from the chipped limbs will be blown back onto your property.
- Once the chipping is completed, do not place anymore limbs, branches and debris along the roadways.
 Violators will be subject to fines and responsible for the cost of removal.

Remember that any tree work, other than removing downed trees, branches and debris from your property, requires Design Committee approval. Workers and tree services are not permitted to perform any cutting or removal of standing trees and vegetation without this approval.

The National Fire Prevention Association's Firewise USA® program teaches folks how to adapt to living with wildfire and encourages neighbors to work together and take proactive action to prevent losses. There are no costs associated with membership. While encouraged, it is not mandatory that all homeowners in the Association comply with implementation of the risk reduction steps necessary to make their homes safer during a wildfire event.

If you're interested in having a Firewise® assessment of your property, contact Anthony English, (706) 754-2354, of the Georgia Forestry Commission and request that an onsite Fire-

Commission and request that an onsite Firewise® Risk Assessment Survey be performed on your home and property. There is no charge, and you do not have to be present for the survey. Following the survey, you will receive a written report identifying any areas where attention is recommended.

Pamphlets are available at the Association office providing an overview of wildfire risk reduction measures that can make your home safer during a wildfire. The major threat during a wildfire in the North Georgia mountains is airborne embers and radiant heat. Historical and empirical data confirm that taking the following simple steps will greatly increase the probability that the integrity of your home will be maintained.

 Maintain a perimeter around your home free of flammable vegetation such as fallen leave

 Clean roofs and gutters of dead leaves, debris and pine needles.



- · Replace or repair loose or missing shingles.
- Clean debris from exterior attic vents and install 1/8-inch mesh screening over the vents.
- Repair or replace damaged or loose window screens or broken windows.
- Clean areas under patios and decks of debris and screen or box in those areas.
- Remove all flammable material away from the foundation such as mulch, flammable plants, leaves and firewood – anything that could burn.
- Remove anything flammable from underneath decks and porches.
- Ensure the area around your propane tank is free of any flammable material.
- Trim branches that overhang the home, porch or deck.
- Store firewood no closer that 30 feet from the home.

Fiber Internet Coming to Blackberry

Ellijay Telephone Company has been awarded an American Rescue Plan Act grant for parts of Gilmer County including Blackberry Mountain. While an exact timeframe has not been set, engineers and contractors are in the process of surveying the existing lines. The fiber will replace Blackberry's existing VDSL lines.

If you are a current ETC customer, no action is required. ETC has your contact information and will be in touch. There will be no fee to change from your current service to fiber. Also, there will be no increase in fees for the basic 50Mb service.

This time of the year, our roadways tend to accumulate leaves and pine needles. The next time you're blowing leaves from your driveway, why not take a few more minutes and clear the road along your property - and maybe your neighbor's too. This will improve the appearance of our roads and make them safer as well.



Your Help Is Needed

To help us better respond to water outages, we're in the process of developing a comprehensive map of the water lines in Blackberry. You can help by identifying the location of the curb stop valve for your property. Generally these valves are located along the main water line and are encassed in a pvc pipe or box. Blue surveyor's flags are available at the office to mark the location.



Report Any Outside Burning

High fire danger conditions are prevalent this time of the year.

Please remember that Blackberry Mountain Association does not allow any outside burning, fire pits, campfires. burn barrels or the burning of leaves, debris and trash.

Visitors and Workers

If you are expecting visitors or service providers, remind therm to use the keypads located at the office and service gates. Also, please remember that the office/Mulkey Road gate and bridge are not for use by service, repair and construction vehicles.



These vehicles must use the Timber Falls Trail service gate. Maps and directions to that gate are available on the Blackberry website.

Also, any vehicle parked at the office/mailbox parking area without proper identification is subject to being towed. All property owners' vehicles should have stickers adhered to the lower driver side area of their windshield.

These stickers are available, free of charge, at the Association office. If you have a guest that needs to park at the office, daily guest parking passes are available during weekday office hours.
